



### PROGRAMME UPDATE

The programme is incredibly busy. Everyday there are up to 8 aircraft, flying to 50+ airstrips across Arnhem Land. We have hundreds of passengers flying every week, each one of them relies on the service MAF provides in this very remote part of the world.

MAF aircraft demonstrate the love of Jesus to the community in many ways. Whilst every person who travels with MAF has a story to tell, some definitely stand out and it is these stories I want to share over the next few prayer letters. My prayer is these bring to life the work in Arnhem Land and help you understand why the work of MAF is so important.

#### RESCUING SURVIVORS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Domestic violence is a big problem in Arnhem Land. Statistically Aboriginal women are 45 times more likely to experience domestic violence than white women and it is endemic in Yolngu communities. MAF partners with Miyalk Women's Shelter. Located in Nhulunbuy, it cares for survivors of domestic abuse. The remoteness of many communities can often leave women feeling trapped and this is where MAF comes in. When an urgent call comes in from the shelter, we drop everything to get an aircraft out to support the woman in need because quite often they are fearing for their lives. Using aircraft not only allows us to reach women faster, it also enables them to leave

reach women faster, it also enables them to leave an abusive partner behind without fear of being caught.

Since the inception of the programme, 3 years ago, over 300 people have been rescued by MAF from abusive family members. That is over 300 people who's lives have been transformed by a MAF aircraft.
