
Winchester City Centre Chaplaincy

Annual Report 2016-17 for Winchester churches

The City Centre Chaplains visit staff who work in the city, at the workplace, in shops, offices and other organisations. We build friendships, listen, and support people when they need it. Chaplaincy is free of charge to receiving organisations, and confidential. We serve people of any background or faith.



Workplace Chaplaincy supports the city centre and its people where they need it. We work closely with other organisations including the City Council, BID and Street Pastors, and are an initiative of Churches Together in Winchester. We are working to serve all city centre organisations.

Some facts and figures for 2016/2017:

We have visiting arrangements with the majority of the 800+ organisations operating in the city, including the City Council, the Law Courts, City Police Service, Debenhams, M&S, The Brooks and a host of smaller businesses. Our records and estimates for the past year show that:

- The team of Chaplains made around 11,000 visits (over 1800 chaplain-hours) to people at the workplace during the year, covering around 3,500 staff, most of them on multiple occasions, because chaplaincy is about long-term relationships.
- Of those visited, around 700 people chose to engage in significant conversations on a confidential basis. The most common topics of conversation were:
 - Work, employment and business situations 0
 - Relationships both inside and outside the workplace 0
 - Personal/family health and wellbeing 0
 - Future plans, uncertainties, life-choices, faith 0
 - 0 Money matters
- Around 230 people requested 1:1 support or asked that the Chaplain pray for them.

Hopes and plans for the Chaplaincy in the coming year:

Some stories from the chaplaincy team:

These are genuine situations and stories but names and details have been changed.

Danny, who works in a large shop in Winchester, told his chaplain that his partner has been diagnosed with a serious illness. The chaplain listened to Danny express his fear for the future, and suggested they meet to talk further in a local café one lunchtime. Over a cup of tea, Danny unloaded his concerns and his chaplain offered to pray for him and his partner in the café where they were. The chaplain continues to visit Danny regularly at the workplace.

Gale, a team leader in a High Street office, always welcomes her chaplain when she calls, and likes to introduce her to new team members. This time, Gale wanted to talk about challenges with her teenage children. In a quiet corner of the office, Gale spoke of her own teenage, years ago, and her need for wisdom to deal with her own family now. She said it was a huge relief to talk about it to her chaplain. Gale asked the chaplain to pray for her family.

Diggory works in an office in Winchester. His chaplain knew he had been through a hard time previously with the breakup of a relationship. This visit, Diggory excitedly told his chaplain that he'd met someone new and was hopeful for the long-term. His chaplain listened and was able to share in Diggory's excitement.

Manda, a shop assistant, told her chaplain she was struggling to make ends meet and was worried about credit card debts. Her chaplain listened and suggested Manda might consider joining a money management help group run by a local charity. Her chaplain connected Manda with the right person.

Hogan, a part-time agency worker, had been asked to be a godparent to his nephew, and asked his chaplain what this would mean. His chaplain agreed to get some good information, and, over a cup of coffee the next week, they talked about God, faith, and how to pray. Hogan has said yes to being a godparent and has been reading Luke's gospel. His chaplain visits regularly and encourages him.
