The harvest season always inspires creativity, challenging us to find new ways to cope with the abundance we have been blessed with personally and an opportunity for us to share these gifts with others who are not so fortunate. Above all, this is a time for us to reflect on all the wonderful things our loving God blesses us with and to give thanks to Him for the bounty of His Creation, given in love for us all to share.

In the second letter to his beloved friend in faith, Timothy, who was leading the church in the challenging environment at Ephesus, St Paul encourages all Christians to *'Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.'* It is thought that Paul's words form something of a valedictory statement, either written shortly before his death from the prison cell in which he was incarcerated, or scribed in memory of him after his death. Either way, Paul's thoughts were focussed on sharing his faith with successive generations of Christians, encouraging us in steadfast faith, confident endurance and lasting love. God's generosity isn't confined to the pages of the Bible or to some deep distant past. It is present all around us today too but often we don't see it because we hold to ourselves the things that God intends us to share. The feeding of the 5,000 began with the generous act of sharing by a young boy who was probably hungry willing to reach out to others with the little that he had. The miraculous way in which God provided for Elijah through the widow and her son only occurred because she was willing to share her last meal.

We are often made aware of the abundance of God when we share our limited resources with others, especially in these times of global pandemic and economic and financial crisis. But we also become aware of the generosity of God when we look for it in the everyday events of our lives. If we focus on our own needs, we can easily get caught in a mentality of scarcity and feel that we don't have anything to share... and that makes us more and more acquisitive and less generous. What do you think?

'Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.' Where have you become aware of the generosity of God in these days of fuel poverty and inflation? Have you felt able to share the good treasure of your lives with others, whether that is by offering your personal wealth, energy, time, kindness or prayer. As we celebrate Harvest Festival this year, may we always be mindful of St Paul's advice to remember Christ, the foundation of our faith. Jesus has given us the Holy Spirit to help us through the trials and the abundance of our lives. Harvest is about thanking God for the gifts He has given us in and through His Son, Jesus Christ, and encourages us to reflect on how we can use these gifts wisely for the good of all.

I leave you with one of my favourite prayer-poems by Gerald Manley Hopkins:

Summer ends now; now, barbarous in beauty, the stooks arise Around; up above, what wind-walks! What lovely behaviour Of silk-sack clouds! Has wilder, wilful-wavier Meal-drift moulded ever and melted across skies?

I walk, I lift up, I lift up heart, eyes, Down all that glory in the heavens to glean our Saviour; And, éyes, heárt, what looks, what lips yet gave you a Rapturous love's greeting of realer, of rounder replies?

And the azurous hung hills are his world-wielding shoulder Majestic—as a stallion stalwart, very-violet-sweet! These things, these things were here and but the beholder Wanting; which two when they once meet, The heart rears wings bold and bolder And hurls for him, O half hurls earth for him off under his feet.

2 Timothy 1:1-14 – Salutation from Paul

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, to Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

I am grateful to God—whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Saviour Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel.

For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.



Luke 17: 5-10 5 – The Mustard Seed

The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!' He replied, 'If you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea," and it will obey you.

Suppose one of you has a servant ploughing or looking after the sheep. Will he say to the servant when he comes in from the field, "Come along now and sit down to eat?" Won't he rather say, "Prepare my supper, get yourself ready and wait on me while I eat and drink; after that you may eat and drink." Will he thank the servant because he did what he was told to do? So you also, when you have done everything you were told to do, should say, "We are unworthy servants; we have only done our duty."
