


**Remembrance Sunday,
Sunday, 8th November 2020**

'Greater love has no one than this; that they lay down their life for their friends.' (John 15: 13)


As our nation enters into a second Coronavirus Lockdown this week, my thoughts and prayers are with each of you and with your families. All restaurants, pubs, gyms, hairdressers and shops selling non-essential goods and services are now closed, along with restrictions on travel and limitations on households from mixing inside homes. All church services have been cancelled, with the exception of funerals which are allowed to continue with a maximum of 30 people in attendance. Even here, there are important qualifications to take into account: outside services, such as a Burial or Interment of Ashes are restricted to 15 people - even those burials which form part of a church-based funeral service. Weddings are only allowed in exceptional 'end of life' circumstances, and even these are restricted to 6 attendees, which include the bride and groom and minister. I ask you to pray for all families affected by these difficult circumstances at an already highly emotional time.



Remembrance Day services have been affected too. Church and Civic gatherings are only permitted on **Sunday, 8th November at 10.55am** and NOT on Wednesday, 11th November, and these services must be held outside at War Memorials or other suitable gathering points, such as at flag poles in churchyards.

The annual Remembrance Sunday March Past the Cenotaph will not take place in London this year. However, a Government-led Remembrance Service will continue to go ahead as a closed ceremony. Despite these changes, people are being encouraged to take part in an act of Remembrance, either by watching the service on television, or pausing for the Two Minute Silence in their home or on their doorsteps.


Hopefully, the new restrictions will end on 2 December, but I imagine this will only come to pass if the whole country joins together in observing strict adherence to the prescribed 'shut-down' measures. Each citizen has a responsibility to the other; and, just as it has been with wearing face-masks in public places, I pray we will look positively at the sacrifices we make in terms of our personal freedom during this time, and offer them up as acts of love and compassion for the health and well-being of our neighbours, our NHS and the vulnerable in our society.

During the last Lockdown, our parish communities set up excellent mechanisms of support for neighbours who needed to self-isolate or who were shielding a vulnerable member of their household. It is gratifying to know that these mechanisms are being revisited to help meet the needs of individuals and families in this second Lockdown. Overwhelmed by the kindness of local residents during this past year, the Mayor of Winchester, Cllr Patrick Cunningham, has initiated *'Local Hero'* Awards in recognition of those who have put others before themselves and selflessly supported others in need with acts of kindness during the COVID-19 pandemic.

You will be thrilled to learn that the teams at Sparsholt Village Shop and Littleton Linkers are among those whose generosity of spirit in going the extra mile and helping those in need have been recognised by the Mayor's *'Local Heroes'* awards. It is important to say that our parishioners in the Test Valley area are also due to be recognised for similar awards! Whilst it is always difficult to name some folks and not others, I am sure I speak on behalf of all our communities in thanking every individual and group who have worked tirelessly for others during this difficult year.

These awards and the work of so many people in the selfless care of others reflect the message of John's Gospel this week, as he reveals Jesus' desire for us to know true joy by being in relationship with Him, and through the outpouring of that joy by the way we devote our lives to loving others.

I once read in a Christian commentary how *'true joy transcends the rolling waves of circumstance.'* This wisdom is the epitome of our faith in Jesus Christ! The joy of living our lives entwined with Love itself, means that whatever adversity we face, we remain in the security of Jesus' love. And through this, we not only find the spiritual capacity to weather the storms of our lives, but also find ourselves possessed of a truly selfless compassion and empathy for the predicaments and needs of others. The joy of helping our neighbour brings us full circle into the arms of love: the Servant King teaches us to love as He loves us, and then pours back upon us such an abundance of His grace as to inspire the action of love in us as the natural, daily reflex-action of our joyful being.

This Remembrance Sunday, however challenging our ability to come together, we must pledge to remember those who have given their lives in the service of our country. We owe them more than we can say. We remember them, their families and loved ones before God now, and commit ourselves to the continuing work of peace and reconciliation in the joy of Christ's holy name, the King of Peace.

The five parishes of The Downs Benefice hold the British Army HQ Andover, ATR Winchester, Middle Wallop and Worthy Down Barracks as our close neighbours. So let us not forget the poignant reality that Service Personnel continue to serve across the globe to ensure that we might live in peace. Now, as we remember the Fallen and those who returned, so we also lift up into God's safekeeping those who continue to risk their lives for our wellbeing - many of whom are our neighbours' children.

We are also wise to remember that these selfless individuals are not the only heroes and heroines of war. WWII, for example, was also fought by many thousands of men, women and children on the Home Front: in reserved occupations and in voluntary roles such as the Police, Medical and Fire units, the Home Guard and ARP, as well as in Munitions factories, down mines, in the Land army, hospitals, schools and railways. Hours were long and conditions often treacherous. Many died in bombing campaigns and many live to this day with physical and psychological scars of war.

On this Remembrance Sunday, we acknowledge the lasting sacrifice of those who have been killed in action *and* those who have survived the horror of war. We remember those who are still in active service; risking their lives, their families and their future prospects for the defence of freedom not just of *our own* country but of countries across the world who struggle for freedom, for justice and for peace.

And we give thanks for the tireless work of countless poppy sellers, Hope for Heroes, the British Legion and its Earl Hague Poppy Fund; The War Memorials Trust, and all those who work so hard to keep today's world focussed on the message of remembrance and the terrible cost of war, especially in these troubling times of Coronavirus.

As we remember the ultimate sacrifice of life in order for us to live in peace, Jesus speaks: Though we might not be asked to sacrifice *our* lives for others, Jesus does ask us to give of ourselves sacrificially in the way we *live out* our lives. Jesus made the first choice, to love and die for us – inviting us to live with Him forever. We must now make the next choice – to accept or reject His offer of eternal life.

And in accepting it, may we who have received the gift of peace in our time repay our fallen brothers and sisters by standing alongside them steadfast, immovable: faithfully committed to the eternal Christian values of freedom, justice, peace and love. As poet Robert Laurence Binyon reminds us:

'They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old'

We *will* remember them – our eternal lives depend upon it!


Schedule of Services

Churches Open for Private Prayer

As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. 15 I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father.

You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.
