

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Context

St Catherine's Church, Littleton, sits within the Downs Benefice, which was created in 2008 and comprises St Catherine's Littleton, St Stephen's Sparsholt with Lainston, St Mary's Crawley, St Mary-the-less Chilbolton and St Peter and Holy Cross Wherwell. The Downs Benefice lies within the Andover Deanery.

Revd Jax Machin, as Incumbent, leads the Benefice with support from a ministry team comprising retired clergy, Licensed Lay Ministers and other lay leaders.

The five Parochial Councils and Benefice Council continue to be supported by the benefice administrators and a vast host of others, who each make a valuable contribution to the work of God in this place.

1.3 Explanation of Strategic Priorities

The following strategic priorities were identified by the Diocese in 2013 and mission action plans (MAPs) have subsequently been formulated to focus on these priorities by the Deanery (dMAP) and through the Deanery by individual benefices (bMAPs) and parishes (pMAPs). The strategic priorities have not changed, but in 2018 a sub-group of the Downs Benefice Council started a review of the current bMAP to chart progress and to refine the objectives for the next three years by reference to the individual parishes. The most recent published version of the bMAP can be found on the web-site (www.downsbenefice.org). As in the last four years, this Annual Report has been laid out in sections by reference to each of the four strategic priorities.

Strategic Priority 1 - Discipleship

We grow authentic disciples going out as individuals passionately, confidently and courageously sharing our faith, and coming together as creative church communities of prayer and worship that live out Kingdom values.

dMAP Objective: To train, resource, and motivate people more readily to live out their faith.

Strategic Priority 2 - Re-imagining the Church

We re-imagine the Church intentionally connecting and engaging with our local communities in culturally relevant ways. We will rejoice in the richness of the "mixed economy" of all ministry and proactively promote vibrant parochial and breathtaking pioneering ministries amongst 'missing' generations, eg children, young people, under 35s.

dMAP Objective: To actively engage with young families, children and youth, especially in schools.

Strategic Priority 3 - Working for Social Transformation

We are agents of social transformation using our influence as a Diocese to transform public and personal life. We will demonstrate loving faith at work in local communities and across the globe, bringing healing, restoration and reconciliation eg through education, social enterprise, health care, spiritual care teams.

dMAP objective: To develop a Pastoral Care Ministry which will transform lives in our local communities.

Strategic Priority 4 - Sacrificial Giving and Good Stewardship

We belong together in Christ, practising sacrificial giving and good stewardship of all that God has entrusted to us. We will combine radical generosity, care and capacity building with a clear focus on directing finance into the mission of Jesus. Sharing and multiplying local good practice, using people, buildings and other resources wisely, we will seek to prune, plant and invest boldly in building for the Kingdom.

dMAP objective: To continue developing a more unified Deanery identity, sharing our resources more eagerly.

2.2 Ministry Team

Our Licensed Lay Ministers (formerly known as Readers), Alan Disher and Charlotte Nash, continued to contribute to and support the ministry team joined by lay leaders Carol Coleman (Littleton), Alastair Barron (Sparsholt), Andrew Kent (Chilbolton) and Sally Wesley (Sparsholt). We owe them all a great debt of gratitude, not only for their hard work but also for the enriching diversity of worship we were privileged to enjoy during the year.

2.3 Services

The monthly schedule of Sunday services in 2018 was as follows:

The averages above show adult attendance and omit Easter Sunday and Christmas Day, where the attendance figures were respectively 78 adults and eight children and 71 adults and three children.

There is a BCP Holy Communion held 9.30 am on 1st and 3rd Wednesdays each month - average attendance nine.

The following services also took place in church or in the parish: Weddings (1), Funerals and services of thanksgiving (10), Baptisms (5), monthly services at Flowerdown and Westholme care homes, Toddler Group services (3), Messy Church (3), Benefice Communion (1), Ash Wednesday, Mothering Sunday, Good Friday meditation, Ascension Day, Trinity Sunday, Littleton Show Service, All Souls, War Memorial (11th November), Posada, Advent compline, Carol Service and Crib Service. In addition, there were morning and evening prayers and other contemplative services which took place in the Church or the Church Room on other occasions throughout the year.

2.4 Deanery Synod

The Andover Deanery Synod met three times in 2018. A new Area Dean was appointed this year and the Deanery is closely involved in a range of new Diocesean initiatives. A new Deanery Mission Action Plan (dMAP) was adopted at the start of the year. This doesn't exist to provide additional objectives for the parishes in the Deanery, but instead seeks to support their individual plans. The Deanery Synod continues to provide a forum where areas of common interest for parishes can be explored. Synod membership also gives the parish representatives a valuable forum to share concerns directly with our Archdeacon and Suffragan Bishop, both of whom have attended one of the synod meetings this year. Each meeting of the synod includes a section where the members can share "good news from the parishes". This is always an inspiring part of the meeting where you get a flavour of the many exciting initiatives that are being fruitfully pursued across our diverse deanery.

2.5 House Groups

2.6 Downs Benefice – 2018 series of Lent Talks

Our 2018 series of five Lent talks, one in each Parish, sadly became four when snow and seriously icy conditions led to the cancellation of the talk planned for Chilbolton. Stuart Palmer was scheduled to tell us about the work of Boaz - an inspirational project based on a horticultural facility close to Chilbolton which provides work-related opportunities for adults with learning disabilities. All is not lost, however, because Stuart is coming to talk to us in the 2019 Lent Series of Talks.

The remaining four talks - all quite different - provoked great interest and were very well received. At Wherwell Jill Bentall told us how she and her husband first settled in Andover and how she became involved in her local church. We had a fascinating insight into Jill's wider ordained Christian Ministry, which reaches across benefices and denominations - not only ministering to us in Downs Benefice from time to time but also regularly taking services in the Methodist church in Andover. At Crawley we heard from Kirsty Plant and Peter Mills about their working life at Argiva, and how their Christian faith underpins their working relationships and directs how they live and work. In Littleton Norman de la Mouette took a packed audience through his life to date and how he came to the Christian faith, eventually being drawn to ordination - fortunately for us, because over the years Norman has become a regularly anticipated visiting Minister in our churches across Downs Benefice. Like Jill Bentall's sermons, Norman's are not to be missed! It was fascinating to hear about Norman's life at work, having had 17 jobs in all including signwriter, teacher and taxi driver. At Sparsholt we heard retired Admiral Mike Gretton talk about his life in the Royal Navy, including his command of HMS Invincible. Mike also has a strong Christian faith and he told us how that has guided his life in the RN and after - Mike has not slowed down since leaving the Navy, variously being Chief Executive of the Duke of Edinburgh's Awards programme, Chairman of Winchester and Eastleigh NHS Trust, Chairman of Hampshire Youth Options, and quite a bit more!

We were privileged to have four inspirational speakers, with generous hospitality and a warm welcome being provided by each of the Parishes, and we look forward to the 2019 Lent Series of talks.

2.8 Prayer

The Benefice Prayer List is produced monthly and copies are available at the back of the church for anyone wishing to use it in their own intercessions. As a result of recent data protection laws people cannot be identified by name and therefore the Prayer List includes only general categories for prayer, as well as recent deaths and the names of people with roles in the church.

A short service of prayer is held in the church room each Tuesday at 4.15 pm. It is based on the Evening Prayers for Healing liturgy and the Prayer List. The Revd Jax Machin now produces a weekly list of people who have asked to be prayed for and these names are included in the service. This list is not copied or circulated and is returned to the Benefice Office immediately after the service. Anyone wishing to be prayed for by name should contact Jax. The Mission Prayer Diary is produced every two months and is designed to help church members pray for the mission interests of St Catherine's. It is available at the back of the church. The Mission Support Group meets every two months (second Monday of alternate months) to share information and prayer. It is held at the house of Alan and Christine Disher in Vernham Road, Weeke, Winchester. For more information, contact Alan at alan@disher.org.uk.

The Prayer Chain is a means by which emergency prayers may be offered by a group of people in response to a critical situation. Anyone wishing to activate the Prayer Chain should telephone the Benefice Office or any member of the Ministry Team. It is a confidential prayer chain which aims to provide prayer support in time of urgent need.

On the fourth Wednesday of each month there is a half-hour service of Meditation at 7.00 pm in St Catherine's church.

2.10 Music

The choir has numbered eleven throughout the year, and has also benefitted on occasion from the help of past choir members and singers from other churches in the Benefice. Deirdre Wratten and Nikita Petrine have both played the organ regularly for the morning and evening services on the third Sunday of each month, and with Harry Halliwell playing at more services and also leading choir practices, we have been able to have organists playing at all regular services.

The selection of hymns for regular services has once more been carried out by Barbara Kingston and Carol Coleman, who also, with Tim Rogerson's input, select the anthems.

One day the choir, and the Church, will have to face potential change and volunteers to join the choir will always be welcome, together with ideas for music in church in the future.

3. STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2

3.1 Littleton Church Toddler Group

This group meets in the Church Room every Monday morning during term-time, and is open to all babies, toddlers, pre-schoolers and their carers from across the Benefice and beyond. Numbers attending have remained high, and we regularly have 12-15 children attending each week with their Mums, Dads, nannies or grandparents.

Weekly crafts include play-dough, painting and collages, and we always finish the session with the Hokey-Cokey which is almost as popular as snack time! As well as providing the children with fun activities and opportunities to improve their social skills (especially sharing!), carers are very appreciative of the chance to relax and discuss the joys and stresses of childrearing.

At Christmas, Harvest and Easter the group meets in the church for a brief celebration, usually with an interactive story about the festival, prayers and singing. This year the village Pre-school joined us for our Harvest Celebration, and the church was full of young children eagerly searching out hidden fruit and veg to fill their shopping bags.

3.2 Children's Work

In addition to Toddler Group and Messy Church (see below), the main focus for children's work at St Catherine's has again been our very popular Posada. This year a total of 19 families hosted Mary, Joseph and their entourage, and they were, as ever, very well entertained. An added bonus this year was a trip to Flowerdown Nursing Home where they joined in with some carol singing. Thankfully, the Posada arrived safely back in church in time for the crib service which was very well attended. The whole event raised £678 (including Gift Aid) for Toybox, a charity which works with street children in Latin America, bringing our total for the ten years that the Posada has been running to over £5,000. 3.3 Messy Church

In the Downs Benefice, Messy Church takes place on the second Saturday of each month (except April and August) between 4 and 6 pm, and circulates around the parishes of Littleton, Sparsholt and Crawley. Sessions take the form of one hour of crafts and other activities around a central Christian theme; a celebration with a Bible story, song and prayers; and a delicious meal to round the afternoon off. This year we have built houses with the wise and foolish builders, bathed in the River Jordan with Naaman, and wielded a hammer with Joseph the carpenter, but most importantly we have had fun together whilst learning about God and his love for us.

We have a tremendous team of volunteers from across the three parishes who willingly spend the afternoon cooking, helping children with crafts, laying tables or simply chatting with parents whilst their children are absorbed in their creations. Excitingly this year some of the older children from our families have transferred over to the helpers' team and have relished the extra responsibilities. Without all these willing helpers, we could not have achieved the wonderful success we have had to date. In 2018 a total of 17 families attended at least one Messy Church, many of whom have very little other contact with the church.

4.2 Village Outreach

St Catherine's hosts:

- the weekly Toddlers' Group, which provides a much-appreciated opportunity for parents and carers to get together. Carol Coleman is the organiser.
- The monthly lunch club for our more senior parishioners. This is organised by Shirley Lupton and supported by cooks and helpers from across the community.

In addition to these regular events there are other activities:

Bereavement Anniversary cards are prepared and hand delivered where possible. Careful planning is given to the organisation of the benefice All Souls service. This involves a personal invitation and where possible a visit to each bereaved person. Our special thanks go to Vivienne Aspin for her expert work in the preparation of these services.

We also owe a big thank you to Geoff and Betty Allen for their regular coffee mornings, which are much appreciated and offer friendship and the opportunity to meet and chat to many of our neighbours.

In late May / early June we had a benefice holiday at Rydal in the Lake District. This was attended by 40 people from the congregations and wider communities within the benefice, who enjoyed the walks, visits and social activities in perfect weather.

We are grateful to the team of drivers who continue to pick up residents from the Sunrise Care Home, enabling them to attend our Sunday services. They really appreciate the participation and the welcome they receive from the St Catherine's congregation. This same team also provides a pick-up service to parishioners who are otherwise unable to attend church.

The St Catherine's Links system in Littleton continues to ensure that each road has a 'Link' who ensures that newcomers are welcomed and that the clergy are informed of sickness or special needs.

4.7 Safeguarding

Following the latest guidance from the Diocese a Benefice Safeguarding Policy is being formulated which will be a statement of what the parishes in the benefice will be doing to keep children and vulnerable adults safe, and the mechanism by which they will respond to any concerns raised. Meanwhile, each PCC has its own designated Safeguarding Officer, details of whom can be found displayed in the porch of each respective parish church. Safeguarding Officers report directly and in confidence to the Rector. Safeguarding is a compulsory item raised at each PCC meeting to ascertain any additional concerns. The Safeguarding Policy document, when adopted, will be considered for revision annually prior to APCM. DBS clearance is sought for any individual deemed to be working in any capacity with children and vulnerable adults. Also all PCC members and Church leaders are required/recommended to take various courses providing safeguarding information and training. In the first instance please raise any concerns you have with the relevant parish Safeguarding Officer or, in an emergency, please contact the Rector.

5.1 Finance

Full accounts have been produced detailing the income and expenditure of the church during 2018. The accounts have been adopted by the PCC and reviewed by an independent examiner. Copies have been posted on the notice boards in the porch and the church room and will be available to download from the church website following the APCM. If you have any questions on the accounts, then please contact Clive Thompsett (01962 885039) who will be able to respond.

This year has seen further growth with the *St Catherine's Friends* and the church is very grateful to the people who are now helping to support the church in this way. Including tax refunds, this scheme contributed £4,600 to our income.

We remain blessed with many people who continue to support the church faithfully through regular planned giving.

As can be seen from the accounts, this year the church's routine expenditure has exceeded its income by £2007; there was also a decrease in the market value of our longer-term investments. This means that we end the year with a decrease in reserves of £2963. Fortunately, during the year we received two legacies totaling £10,300 so our unrestricted reserves have grown by £7337.

The PCC has continued its policy of supporting a range of mission partners both financially and through the development of long-term relationships. The list of donations made in 2018 is as follows:

5.3 Church Fabric

The church building is currently in a good state of repair, and the log book and terrier are up to date.

As stated in the 2015 Annual Review the required quinquennial inspection was carried out by the appointed architect, James Lunn-Rockliffe on 2nd September 2015. The subsequent formal report noted that the general condition of the church was "good" with "little needing immediate attention". Those items which were suggested for immediate attention were all carried out in 2015.

Repairs to the plastered wall beside the vestry door and re-painting of parts of the chancel arch were carried out in 2018.

Most of the fencing around the Church was replaced in Spring 2018. It is intended to replace the fencing in front of the War Memorial and to carry out refurbishment works to the Main Road entrance and steps during 2019.

The works to the graveyard entrance on the corner of Main Road and Church Lane were finally completed in 2018 with splendid results. We record our thanks to the generous anonymous donor, who paid for all the work, and to the various designers, craftsmen, contractors and professionals who brought the project to fruition. There is to be a formal dedication of the new entrance in 2019.

Routine inspection and maintenance work was also carried out in the church during the year.
